

O1 SIX DAVENPORT POLICE OFFICERS ATTEND FIELD TRAINING OFFICER SCHOOL

In early January, six Davenport Police Officers attended a threeday Field Training Officer School to become Davenport PD's newest Field Training Officers.

Field Training Officers provide newly hired officers with oneon-one learning and mentoring in the real-world environment. Officers learned the tools necessary to become an effective teacher and mentor to guide and provide skills to new Davenport Police Officers.



O2 THREE NEW DPD OFFICERS SWORN-IN

Alexander Dunagan, Emmanuel Lopez, and lan-Anthony Johnson were sworn in as Davenport Police Officers by Mayor Mike Matson after completing a 16-week basic law enforcement training at the lowa Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA). These officers completed their post-academy training and began the 17-week Field Training Officer Program where they will learn the skills to serve and protect our community through hands-on experiences and interactions with citizens.



O3 DPD COLLABORATES WITH COMMUNITY PARTNERS AT MENTAL HEALTH CONFERENCE

Davenport Police Mental Health Liaison, Officer Kevin Carver, represented the City of Davenport at the Eastern Iowa Mental Health Conference and Workshop.

Using a Systems of Care approach, the Eastern Iowa Mental Health and Disability Services Region conducted a Sequential Intercept Mapping (SIM) exercise to increase collaboration between institutions that serve youth and families.

This exercise brought community institutions, law enforcement, therapists, school district personnel, judges, county attorneys, juvenile court and detention officers, advocates, and other personnel together in an effort to improve access to care for youth with behavioral health and trauma-related conditions.



11 THREE FIREFIGHTERS HONORED WITH MEDAL OF VALOR

Lieutenant Jeff Pilgrim, Firefighter Cory Schaeckenbach, and Firefighter Trevor Dodson were presented with the Medal of Valor for their response to a structure fire on December 23, 2022. Each individual was recognized for their excellent decision-making and ability to execute high-level situational awareness as well as their commitment to protect and serve our community.

The Medal of Valor is presented to individuals whose actions clearly stand out while performing their duties under hazardous conditions to save the life of another. The recipients of this award receive a cross medallion and a red Valor breast bar to be worn on their departmental uniform.





"All of the personnel on scene this day should be acknowledged for their professionalism and dedication. This incident lasted for several hours, and weather conditions, rapid growth of the fire, the size of the building, and the number of occupants made this situation demanding. Rarely is a crew presented with two different, and separate, rescue situations at one incident. But the crew of Truck 3 "A" shift accepted that challenge, and was able to successfully rescue multiple people."

05 PUBLIC SAFETY FEDERAL RESOURCE UPDATE

In September, a delegation of Quad City Mayors and Police Chiefs traveled to Washington, D.C. to meet with Iowa and Illinois Senators to advocate for federal law enforcement resources to the Quad City metro area. Since returning, staff has continued to engage with Senate staff on this request, providing further data and information on the need for additional federal law enforcement resources to combat violent gun crime in our region. In addition, the Senators from Iowa and Illinois have been engaged in continuous dialogue with the Department of Justice on these requests.

In January, senior leadership from the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) Kansas City Field Office and the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) Omaha Field Office traveled to Davenport to meet with Chief Jeff Bladel and Major Jamie Brown to discuss how to enhance inter-agency efforts aimed at reducing violent crime in our community.





06 LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS

Each year, the Davenport City Council adopts legislative priorities ahead of the State of Iowa legislative session. This year, the City's legislative priorities include automatic traffic enforcement, tax increment finance (TIF), property tax reform, building and fire code amendments, and funding for a High-Risk Unit for the 7th Judicial District. Prior to the start of the legislative session, City staff met with local state elected representatives to discuss the City's legislative priorities and to understand the priorities of our local elected delegation.

In January, representatives from the City of Davenport, Davenport Police Department, Bettendorf Police Department, Scott County Sheriff's Office, and the 7th Judicial District Correctional Services traveled to Des Moines at the request of Representative Gary Mohr to meet with the judiciary appropriations subcommittee chair in regards for the request for funding for a High-Risk Unit for the 7th Judicial District. High-Risk Units work closely with local law enforcement agencies to ensure public safety and prevent high-risk offenders from reoffending violently within the communities in which they reside while on probation or parole.

O7 2023 DAVENPORT FIRE EXPLORER PROGRAM BEGINS

The 2023 class of the Davenport Fire Explorers program kicked off in January. Six youth from the community met at Central Fire Station for a station tour and fire extinguisher training. Over the next ten months, this hands-on program will provide training and education to those with an interest in learning more about careers in fire and emergency services. Explorers will be trained in various fire service-related topics and gain hands-on experience. They will also learn leadership and life skills that will be utilized in their everyday life.

Quinnie Rodman's wonderful vocalizations, paired with Daniel DP Sheridan's utterly stunning lighting and Kris Eitrheim's gorgeous set, created a radiance of energy that resulted in a truly breathtaking theatrical moment.

08 CITIBUS ADDS THREE BUSES TO FLEET

Davenport continues to demonstrate its commitment to improving its public transportation program and rider experience by adding three new buses to the fleet. Replacing three twenty-year-old buses, the new lower-emission high-tech buses include collision avoidance, security cameras, and an improved wheelchair restraint system. Passengers from all routes can enjoy the new ride as the buses are assigned to various routes throughout the week. FTA grant funds of \$1.4 million and local funds of \$220,000 were used to place the new buses online.



O9 FLOOD UPDATES & PROJECTS

The City has been steadfast in its efforts to implement the City's 2021/2022 Flood Resilience Study components. Work to improve the City's resilience to floods will continue for several years.

Current updates:

- Phase II, clearing and repair, on Black Hawk and Walnut Creek berm repairs is in the planning stage.
 Work is expected to begin in the spring of 2023.
 Once complete, a new maintenance schedule will be implemented.
- The Union Station flood defense system project continues through the FEMA approval process.
- The City plans to resubmit an \$18M+ RAISE grant for storm sewer improvements and targeted road raises that will maintain access to River Drive through river stage 17.5 feet with little to no staff intervention/response, establish a permanent flood detour to river stage 22 feet once River Drive is closed due to flood waters, and keep access to the Centennial and Government Bridges open during flood events greater than 22 feet. After submitting the grant in 2022 and making it through several rounds, the City was informed it was not approved during that grant cycle; however, reviewers provided feedback to bolster a second submission in the spring of 2023.
- A project to perform storm sewer improvements to prevent flood waters from inundating the area of River Drive from 3rd Street to Carey Avenue and the intersection of River Drive and Marquette Street will both be released for bid in August of 2023.

As a priority separate from the resilience study, three projects to reduce flood risk at the regional Water Pollution Control Plant and neighboring Davenport Compost Facility are in varying stages. A southern berm is anticipated to begin construction early summer of 2023. As construction on the berm starts, the City expects to receive news on the status of a \$3.8M BRIC grant that will construct a northern berm. Pending a grant application, engineering and design of a third project to build a rail overpass and a new, higher-elevation access road to both facilities should begin this spring.







10 2022 INFRASTRUCTURE IN REVIEW

Investment in modernizing our arterial roads, neighborhood streets, and other infrastructure continued at record levels in 2022. As a priority area for growth and a vibrant future for our community, continuous improvements are being planned.

Completed Arterial and Collector Streets Projects:

- · Division from Locust to 12th
- 2nd from Brady to the Government Bridge
- Lombard from Harrison to Brady
- · Locust from Clark to Michigan
- Central Park from Cedar to Hickory Grove (More work slated for the intersection in 2023)
- 53rd and Eastern Intersection
- 53rd and Jersey Ridge Intersection
- 53rd from Lorton to Elmore Circle (More work slated in 2023)
- Hillandale and Research Parkway Intersection
- Hillandale and Northwest Blvd Intersection
- Northwest Blvd and 76th Intersection
- Division from Research Parkway to the I-80 Bridge



12 DREAM UPDATE

O1 LIBRARY CATALOG GETS A NEW LOOK

RiverShare Library online catalogs received a new look in January. Cardholders will enjoy many new features including recommendations.

Reading Recommendations compiles all the different ways that patrons can find titles to add to their list of books to read, including links to New Releases, NoveList, the sign-up page for the Recommends newsletter, Staff Picks publication, LibGuides, the BookFix service, Info Café Blog, Simply Held, and the Checked In podcast.

O2 DAVENPORT LIBRARIES GO FINE FREE

In January the Davenport Public Library, along with all the libraries in the RiverShare Library System, eliminated overdue fines for items returned after the due date. The Board of Trustees also waived existing overdue fines for all Davenport Public Library patrons. This change allows the Library to further its goal of eliminating barriers to accessing the Library.



03 WINTER READING CHALLENGE

O1 FIREFIGHTERS VISIT LOCAL SCHOOL

This provides an opportunity to introduce youth on what to expect in an emergency situation so not to be afraid.
