# **LEGISLATIVE UPDATE** & GOVERNOR SIGNING



City staff worked closely with our state delegation to advance several key priorities during the 2022 legislative session. City staff began work with legislators last summer, advocating for several priorities across the public safety continuum. These priorities included the passage of a public safety nuisance bill, as well as state funding for multisystemic therapy for at risk individuals in our community.



The public safety nuisance bill was passed by both the House and Senate and was signed by Governor Reynolds

in Davenport on June 9. This bill allows cities to pursue an abatement process through the local court system for alcohol establishments where a demonstrated public safety nuisance has occurred.

City staff also worked with our local delegation to defeat proposed legislation in the Governor's housing omnibus bill that would have preempted cities from adopting their own building and fire codes and instead created a state-wide building and fire code. In the end, this language was stripped from the bill, allowing cities to adopt their own building and fire codes.

# CAPRA ACCREDITATION VIRTUAL REVIEW VISIT FOR PARKS & RECREATION

During the week of June 13-17, Davenport Parks and Recreation staff hosted a virtual, week-long review visit with three industry professionals from Colorado, Arizona, and Wisconsin as part of the CAPRA Agency Accreditation process. The visit included document and evidence reviews, virtual meetings, and a two-hour virtual tour of park spaces that make Davenport unique. These spaces included Vander Veer Conservatory, Gabe's All-Inclusive Play Village, Davenport Junior Theatre, Main Street Landing and LeClaire Park, the Riverfront, and Credit Island Park. This accreditation review was the culminating experience of the review year. Final determinations and recertification will be announced in September as part of the National Parks and Recreation Association's annual conference held in Phoenix. Arizona.

### FIRE STATION 3 - UPDATE

On June 7, the City successfully received bids for the construction of the new Fire Station 3. City Council approved the construction contract with Tricon General Construction in the amount of \$10,784,000 at the June 22 Council Meeting. Staff expects the project to begin in early fall with an estimated completion date in late 2023.

# BEHIND LANDING FAIR OAKS FOODS

FISCAL VITALITY SE

Fair Oaks Foods is planning to construct a state-of-the-art food production facility in Davenport. The \$134 million investment includes a 150,000 square-foot facility in the Eastern Iowa Industrial Center and will create an estimated 247 new full-time jobs. The company plans to begin operations in early 2024.

The City's economic development team of Susanne Knutsen and Tom Linehan, collaborated across a wide range of City departments to showcase Davenport's readiness to work with manufacturing companies looking to call the QC home. In this case, City staff first met with Fair Oaks Foods in July of 2021. Representatives from Fair Oaks Foods and their site consultant Brandon Talbert, with Austin Consulting, sat down with staff from engineering, planning, water pollution control, building, fire and economic development to review land development option and potential locations on why Davenport should be the home of their Fair Oaks Foods expansion.

Following a successful initial visit, the company returned in August to visit Davenport with Michael L. Thompson, President and CEO. This was a smaller group visit to get an overall feel of the community and see if Davenport was a good culture fit that embraced many of the same values of Fair Oaks Foods.

The QC Chamber and City staff collaborated on a <u>unique</u> <u>business attraction video</u> to keep Davenport top of mind. This video was sent to both the business and site selector in early September.

Due to economic conditions outside the company's control, the project selection process took a hiatus until early 2022. At this point in time, staff knew that Fair Oaks Foods was considering at least one other location outside of lowa as a potential site. During this period, City and Chamber staff met with local experts in the agricultural field to learn more about the pork industry and why lowa was top for a bacon plant. lowa ranks #1 in the nation for pork production and supplies 1/3 of the nation's hog production.

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

Following multiple conversations in early spring with both the company and site selector, City staff met once again with Fair Oaks Foods engineering and design contractors to begin the laying out the framework of the plant within the Eastern lowa Industrial Center.

This meeting and others along the way ultimately signaled to Davenport that Fair Oaks Foods had embraced Davenport and made the decision to choose lowa as their location of choice. The decision was based on several factors including the QC's highly-skilled workforce, close proximity of suppliers, securing a certified site with room for expansion, and the region's close-knit community and culture.

Construction is anticipated to begin in summer 2022 on a 32-acre site near Interstate 80. This development is expected to have an annual economic impact of \$182 million, making it the largest business attraction project in the region's history.

# **PROJECT UPDATE**

Community and Economic Development staff has been busy making DREAM(s) come true for area residents.

In spite of ongoing labor and supply shortages, the Davenport DREAM Project surges on. All Round 1 projects are complete, Round 2 has 42 out of 44 projects complete or close to completion, and Round 3 projects have begun, with 11 out of 45 projects complete and several currently in progress.

The Round 4 application process recently closed with 174 applications being received.

Using ARPA funding, the extension program DREAM Plus is currently a major focus with the goal of providing recommendations to City Administration by early/mid-July.






#### **Davenport Junior Theatre (DJT) turns 70 years**

# RIVERFRONT & PROGRAMMING

The Davenport riverfront has been full of fun for the whole family. Over 20 free events took place in 5 different venues in the month of June, bringing over 15,000 citizens weekly to the riverfront. Riverpalooza, a new concert series held every Thursday in Quinlan Court, showed its popularity with over 400 residents attending the first night. Movies on the Mississippi, QC Empowerment Network Open Air Market, and Music on the River all returned with great success along the Freight House Farmers' Market, a riverfront staple. Staff has created a relationship with several local food vendors providing opportunities to attend multiple events each week.

The first riverboat docking of the 2022 season brought over 150 guests to Davenport. Passengers enjoy attractions such as The Figge, the Putnam Museum, Freight House Farmers' Market, and the Skybridge as well as local restaurants and shops. There will be over 30 more stops in the 2022 season.
